# <u>Municipal Manager's Blog</u>



I thought this would be an excellent time to provide some information on the process our community (and most communities in the State of New Jersey) follows for land development. To give you a better sense of how a housing complex or commercial site comes to be and the role and responsibilities of the planning/zoning boards in deciding to approve or deny them. As I have clarified in past articles, this topic is the subject of many books that contain hundreds of pages referencing statutes and cases that you can read to be better informed. This article provides a broader look that may pique your interest to dive deeper.

First, you should know that almost all development applications heard by the boards are initiated by private citizens or businesses, not your governing body or township officials. Second, every application that complies with the NJ Municipal Land Use Law and the Township Land Use Ordinance requirements MUST be accepted, processed, reviewed by Township professionals, and ultimately decided by the planning or zoning boards after a full and fair hearing. And when I say every single application.....I mean it. For example, suppose the Lawrence Shopping Center wants to make an application for developing an amusement park that will cover every inch of the property, or a local church wants to build a 50,000-seat stadium next to Lawrence Road. In these cases, despite their absurdity, the application filed by the party MUST be accepted, and a hearing is ultimately scheduled so the board members can decide to either approve or deny.

Third, each board member must consider the NJ Municipal Land Use Law, the Lawrence Township Land Use Ordinance, the testimony of the fact witnesses, the testimony of expert witnesses, and the comments offered during public participation by residents, property owners, or business owners before rendering their decision. Finally, the mere fact that an application becomes a hearing before a board in no way, shape, or form should cause you to believe that the "Township" endorses it or wants it approved and made a reality. That would be a false assumption. Individual elected and appointed officials may have a personal opinion about whether the project would benefit the community. Still, those personal opinions carry little to no weight in the process.

NOTE: Neither the LSC nor the local church has any such plans!!!!

The Lawrence Township Planning Board has 11 voting members (eight community residents appointed by the governing body, the Mayor, a Council Member, and the Director of Community Development, the Municipal Manager). The Board's duties include supervision over the drafting of the Master Plan for the Township (reviewed every six years), reviewing proposed ordinances to make sure they comply with the Master Plan, and reviewing and deciding every application for a proposed subdivision, development, or building project (site plan) to ensure compliance with our land ordinance. This Board has the power to grant specific variances (i.e., a request to deviate from a current zoning requirement) related to the shape and size of buildings and plots of land.

The Lawrence Township Zoning Board of Adjustment (the Zoning Board) has nine voting members appointed by the governing body. The Board's sole authority is to review development and building applications that require a "use" variance. In addition to the "bulk" size and shape requirements, each parcel of land is assigned a particular use (a zone) or set of uses permitted under the Master Plan and zoning ordinance. Any different use for that land requires a variance. For example, building a commercial property in an area zoned only for residential use would go to the zoning board for review and decision.

The residents who serve on these boards are volunteers. They donate their time reviewing plans and attending hearings (often late into the evening) and, for the most part, do not receive much, if any, appreciation from their fellow residents. At times, they are subject to thoughtless (and hurtful) corruption claims by residents who oppose a project to advance their interests. Though it is an important job, it is thankless.

But knowing the members as I do, they don't do the work to receive appreciation; they do it out of their sense of community volunteerism and believing themselves capable of the important responsibility.

Though many believe these boards can vote to deny applications because they are unpopular with a group of vocal residents who attend the hearings in opposition, denying the application that bows to peer pressure may not end the application process. New Jersey law sets forth specific guidelines for when applications should and should not be granted.

Notably, the members of these boards swear an oath as follows:

I, [Jane Doe], do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully, impartially, and justly perform all the duties of the Lawrence Township Planning Board/Zoning Board member according to the best of my ability. So help me God."

I witnessed firsthand that board members honor this oath, understanding that their decision to grant or deny an application will disappoint someone or many. Should a board vote "no" without a basis in law or fact on an application, the applicant can (and often does) appeal the decision to the Superior Court of New Jersey. Significantly, the Judge assigned to hear the appeal is not influenced by public opinion, and their job is strictly to apply the law. The Judge will consider the application's facts and apply the law to determine whether the Board's decision should be overturned upheld or if the Board should look at the application again. One of the founding principles of our country is the establishment of laws to protect individual property rights. The appeal process ensures that the law is followed. As a result, applicants who follow the law can count on their application being granted by appealing to the Court.

Those who attend hearings and advocate for their interests or the more significant interests of the community should know, understand, and respect that the members of these boards have a fiduciary obligation to honor their oath and the established laws of the State of New Jersey and the Township of Lawrence. "NIMBY" (Not in My Backyard) is alive and well in every community, including this one. It makes their decisions that much harder, but our boards have demonstrated a commitment to do their job, knowing if they vote to please a vocal crowd, all that would result is an appeal to a Court, at significant cost and expense to the taxpayers of Lawrence Township, and the ultimate approval of the application they denied for the wrong reasons.

I hope the above gives you a better understanding of the planning board and zoning board process and a better appreciation for the challenging responsibilities your fellow residents undertake when they volunteer to serve on these boards. For the curious, do a Google search for the following New Jersey cases: "The Pizzo-Mantin case," "Toll Brothers v. West Windsor case," or "W.L. Goodfellows and Co. v. Washington Township Planning Board," and you will get a better sense that a board's denial is meaningless if the law or the facts don't support it.

Eligible home improvements include roofing, windows, electrical upgrades, heating systems, water heaters, insulation, plumbing and any other health, safety or code violations. The program is structured as a forgivable loan. There are no monthly payments and no interest. If you stay in your home for ten years, you will owe nothing to Lawrence.

The program is available for owner-occupied single-family homes, condominiums, townhomes and duplexes in which the owner occupies one of the units. To be eligible to participate, your gross annual income (meaning pre-tax income) for all household members must be less than:








### Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR)

This program provides property tax relief to New Jersey residents who own or rent property in New Jersey as their principal residence and meet certain income limits. The current filing season for the ANCHOR benefit is based on 2020 residency, income, and age.

### New: We Will File for You; No Action Required by You

We will file ANCHOR applications on behalf of most qualified residents who received an ANCHOR benefit earlier this year (for tax yea 2019). If you qualify, you may have received an "ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter." notifying you that you meet the requirements.

File by Phone (Homeowners Only)

1-877-658-2972

If the information in your confirmation letter remains the same as your prior filing, no action is required on your part. Benefit payments will be issued using the same method and banking information used in your prior filing and contained in your confirmation letter. The letter serves as your confirmation of filing and we will not send you an additional confirmation number. However, you can check the status of your benefit payment beginning in mid-October.

If any **information** from your prior filing changed, you must file your **application** to update these changes (using one of the blue buttons) before **September 30, 2023**. If you file online, be sure to choose "CONFIRM" at the end of the process to receive a confirmation number. If you file by phone, do not hang up until you receive your confirmation number. Keep this number for your records as proof that you filed an updated application. We do not issue confirmation numbers for paper applications.

You will not be able to make adjustments to your application after **September 30, 2023**. Payments will be issued using the information we have on file.

Some people who received an ANCHOR benefit last year may receive a green or purple filing packet in the mail instead of a confirmation letter. If you received one of these packets follow the instructions in the packet to apply for your benefit.

### I did not receive an ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter or filing packet. Can I still apply for the benefit?

If you did not receive a confirmation letter or filing packet but meet the qualifications for the benefit based on 2020 residency, income, and age, you may still apply for the program:

Homeowners, Most homeowners may file online or by phone with an identification number (ID) and PIN. However, if you bought your home in 2020, altered your deed, or had certain life changes such as a divorce or death of a spouse, you must file an application by mail.

Renters may file using the online option, and do not need an ID and PIN.

### When will I receive my ANCHOR benefit?

Payments will be issued on a rolling basis. Most applicants can expect to receive their payment approximately 90 days after filing the application, unless we request additional information to process your claim.

### Filing deadline

If you received the ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter notifying you that you qualify and you do nothing else, we will file the application for you and pay the benefit based on information in that letter. However, if you need to change any information, you have until **September 30, 2023**, to file an application on your own.

All other applicants have until Friday, December 29, 2023, to file applications.

### Scam Alert

We will never initiate a text exchange to request personally identifiable information regarding your ANCHOR benefit.

We urge you to contact us directly before providing any sensitive personal information in response to received communications claiming to be related to the ANCHOR program. Visit our <u>Scams page</u> for more information.



### **ANCHOR Canvassing**

Due to recent property tax affordability legislation passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Murphy, you may be eligible for significant relief.

The Department of the Treasury is launching a new initiative, the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team, to conduct door-to-door outreach and application assistance to residents across the state. Canvassers will provide information and help complete applications for those who need assistance filing for ANCHOR. The Community Outreach Team will be going door-to-door daily throughout the state beginning September 26th, from the hours of 1 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Please take a moment and answer the questions when someone knocks on your door from the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team. All answers are confidential and can help you access up to \$1,750 in property tax relief.

Members of the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team will be credentialed with identification badges as the "ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team." They will wear blue safety vests while working in the community. The canvasser will ask questions regarding eligibility and use the information to assist residents with their property tax application.

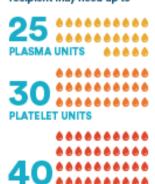


