<u>Municipal Manager's Blog</u>



I was reading an article in the most recent edition of NJ Municipalities. It was on the subject of Municipal Capital Projects. It started with the following quote from John F. Kennedy,

"Change is the law of life. And those who look only to the past or the present are certain to miss the future."

I had not heard it before, but it did resonate with me. I love a good quote! As Municipal Manager, I have encountered many people who subconsciously fear change and consciously oppose issues that move our town forward, whether it involves development, redevelopment, capital improvements, municipal services, or restructuring a fire department to answer the community's public safety needs. No matter the issue or the actions the elected officials or I take that are intended to impact the community positively; there will undoubtedly be opposition and disagreement in some form or another. In my first few years, I had the naïve thought that there was no way someone could be against "this or that," but it never took too long to understand how wrong I was. As I approach my seventh year in the position, though I strive for universal approval, I understand it is impossible.

Several months ago, at a council meeting where a redevelopment project was being discussed, an elderly man approached the podium to participate in public comment. I know this man to be a good man with a good heart and a strong interest in our community and its governance. He said that "we don't need any more apartments" in our community in an effort to oppose a potential housing project. It followed up on a similar position espoused by a former elected official from our town. I found the comment to be disappointing and shortsighted. The idea of "closing borders" is in the national conversation, and at times, it also becomes a local battle cry. But for the local issue, I think some aspects need to be considered that are not.

I am certain this man has lived in this community for decades in a house he owns that probably does not have a mortgage. So, when he says the town doesn't need any more apartments, he is coming from the mindset that he does not have a need for an alternative housing situation in our town. But many people do. I can't tell you how often I have heard that younger people who grew up in Lawrence Township and want to stay and live here in their young adulthood can't afford to. Or for the elderly person (or couple) looking to downsize, sell their home, and can't find an affordable rental situation in town. Or Lawrence Township's never-ending obligation to provide and meet affordable housing requirements (by creating new housing) as determined by the NJ Supreme Court. We call it an obligation, but it is better stated to be our responsibility that we should want to meet - and we do! Like it or not, we need to remain a thriving community, and housing is interwoven with what a thriving community means. This is not to say that there should be a frenzy of new housing built in our town, but responsible growth is necessary. And for those who will argue that our schools are overcrowded as a way to fight new housing developments, I will tell you that the data shows this is not true.

Opposition to change is also present in our efforts to transition from a volunteer firefighting force to a combined volunteer-career fire department. You see it on the various community FB pages and in letters directed to our elected officials. Though the struggle to find and have volunteer firefighters join a fire company and respond to calls is a national problem being addressed by thousands of communities just like ours, there is a small group of volunteers who have a difficult time adjusting from their autonomous status of self-rule as a fire company serving our community to one providing fire protection within a combined fire department under the supervision and command of a township official. We all knew that this period of transition was going to be challenging – because change is difficult.

But our elected officials and I are responsible for ensuring public safety. If we put community first above the wants and needs of a volunteer firefighter and individual volunteer fire company, the path forward is clear – though the road will be bumpy.

Since 2017, we have made substantial efforts to support the volunteer fire companies, honor their service, and responsibly address the serious needs of our community for firefighting services. Will we ever get to the point where every individual volunteer firefighter will accept the change or agree with the decisions made in the interests of the entire community? No – most assuredly, no. But that's not the goal – and it can't be the goal. Whether it relates to capital improvement projects, residential and commercial development projects, or addressing serious public safety issues, change is the law of life, and we can't miss our future. We want Lawrence Township to thrive, to take action that allows us to continue to provide the services our residents deserve and expect, and to make our community diverse and dynamic.



Leaf collection will begin on November 6, 2023.

Residents will continue to place loose leaves at the curb for collection.

The Township will assign (1) one leaf collection crew to each brush zone for approximately eight weeks of collection. Each crew will continue to collect leaves in your zone on a "street by street" basis through December 29, 2023. Residents can expect three (3) collections during this period.

During the months of November and December, BRUSH COLLECTION WILL BE SUSPENDED. DO NOT PLACE BRUSH AT CURB FOR PICK-UP.

Leaves shall be placed ten feet from any storm drains.

The revised procedures have been implemented to adhere with the new Municipal Stormwater Regulations. This program is intended to give residents a more efficient leaf removal while protecting the environment.

shall be placed in an area of the street or road edge not greater than four feet (4') from the edge of the pavement. There is no restriction on the pile length for leaf collection.

October is the last month for collecting yard waste until January 2024.

Officer Spotlight



The Lawrence Home Improvement Program

Lawrence is accepting names for participation in its municipally sponsored home improvement program for low and moderate-income families. Your name can be added to the waiting list by calling our program consultant Affordable Housing Administrators at 732-966-0674.

Eligible home improvements include roofing, windows, electrical upgrades, heating systems, water heaters, insulation, plumbing and any other health, safety or code violations. The program is structured as a forgivable loan. There are no monthly payments and no interest. If you stay in your home for ten years, you will owe nothing to Lawrence.

The program is available for owner-occupied single-family homes, condominiums, townhomes and duplexes in which the owner occupies one of the units. To be eligible to participate, your gross annual income (meaning pre-tax income) for all household members must be less than:



Thank you for your interest in the Mercer County Clerk's Office Property Alert Service.


By signing up for this service, you are taking the first step in protecting your property. By registering, you are now able to track your property and you will receive e-mail alerts immediately if a document with your name or property description is recorded in the Mercer County Clerk's Office. Unfortunately, property and mortgage fraud is a fast growing crime in the United States. Unscrupulous individuals record fraudulent documents like fake deeds or liens against property owners.

Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR)

This program provides property tax relief to New Jersey residents who own or rent property in New Jersey as their principal residence and meet certain income limits. The current filing season for the ANCHOR benefit is based on 2020 residency, income, and age.

New: We Will File for You; No Action Required by You



We will file ANCHOR applications on behalf of most qualified residents who received an ANCHOR benefit earlier this year (for tax yea 2019). If you qualify, you may have received an "ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter "" notifying you that you meet the requirement.

If the information in your confirmation letter remains the same as your prior filing, no action is required on your part. Benefit payments will be issued using the same method and banking information used in your prior filing and contained in your confirmation letter. The letter serves as your confirmation of filing and we will not send you an additional confirmation number. However, you can check the <u>status of your benefit payment</u> beginning in mid-October.

If any **information** from your prior filing changed, you must file your **application** to update these changes (using one of the blue buttons) before **September 30, 2023**. If you file online, be sure to choose "CONFIRM" at the end of the process to receive a confirmation number. If you file by phone, do not hang up until you receive your confirmation number. Keep this number for your records as proof that you filed an updated application. We do not issue confirmation numbers for paper applications.

You will not be able to make adjustments to your application after **September 30, 2023**. Payments will be issued using the information we have on file.

Some people who received an ANCHOR benefit last year may receive a green or purple filing packet in the mail instead of a confirmation letter. If you received one of these packets follow the instructions in the packet to apply for your benefit.

I did not receive an ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter or filing packet. Can I still apply for the benefit?

If you did not receive a confirmation letter or filing packet but meet the qualifications for the benefit based on 2020 residency, income, and age, you may still apply for the program:

Homeowners, Most homeowners may file online or by phone with an identification number (ID) and PIN. However, if you bought your home in 2020, altered your deed, or had certain life changes such as a divorce or death of a spouse, you must file an application by mail.

Renters may file using the online option, and do not need an ID and PIN.

When will I receive my ANCHOR benefit?

Payments will be issued on a rolling basis. Most applicants can expect to receive their payment approximately 90 days after filing the application, unless we request additional information to process your claim.

Filing deadline

If you received the ANCHOR Benefit Confirmation Letter notifying you that you qualify and you do nothing else, we will file the application for you and pay the benefit based on information in that letter. However, if you need to change any information, you have until **September 30, 2023**, to file an application on your own.

All other applicants have until Friday, December 29, 2023, to file applications.

ANCHOR Canvassing

Due to recent property tax affordability legislation passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Murphy, you may be eligible for significant relief.

The Department of the Treasury is launching a new initiative, the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team, to conduct door-to-door outreach and application assistance to residents across the state. Canvassers will provide information and help complete applications for those who need assistance filing for ANCHOR. The Community Outreach Team will be going door-to-door daily throughout the state beginning September 26th, from the hours of 1 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Please take a moment and answer the questions when someone knocks on your door from the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team. All answers are confidential and can help you access up to \$1,750 in property tax relief.

Members of the ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team will be credentialed with identification badges as the "ANCHOR Property Tax Relief Outreach Team." They will wear blue safety vests while working in the community. The canvasser will ask questions regarding eligibility and use the information to assist residents with their property tax application.

The Components of Blood

Those most needed by patients are:

WHOLE BLOOD

Whole blood contains red cells, white cells and platelets suspended in plasma.

USE: MAJOR TRAUMA/SURGERY, (LIMITED CIVILIAN USE)

RED BLOOD CELLS

Red blood cells carry hemoglobin and are essential for oxygen exchange in the lungs.

USE: ANEMIA, SURGICAL BLOOD LOSS, CHEMOTHERAPY

PLATELETS

Platelets are small cell fragments whose main function is to interact with clotting proteins to stop or prevent bleeding.

USE: THROMBOCYTOPENIA, CONGENITAL AND ACQUIRED PLATELET DISORDERS

PLASMA

Plasma is a fluid, composed of ~92% water and 8% proteins, mineral salts, sugars, fats, hormones and vitamins.




