The following are the Minutes of a Regular Meeting of the Lawrence Township Council that was held on Tuesday, February 3, 2026, at 6:30 p.m.

The meeting was opened with the Inspiration and Pledge of Allegiance, led by the Municipal Clerk.

Mayor Bobbitt welcomed everyone to the meeting, and stated that February is Black History Month.

At the commencement of the meeting Mayor Bobbitt read the following statement of proper notice:

STATEMENT OF PROPER NOTICE: "Adequate notice of this meeting of the Lawrence Township Council being held on Tuesday, February 3, 2026, has been provided through the posting of the annual meeting schedule of said Council in accordance with Section 13 of the Open Public Meetings Act." Said Notice was forwarded to The Trentonian, The Times and The Princeton Packet on December 12, 2025.

The roll was then called as follows:

Also in attendance were Kevin Nerwinski, Esq., Municipal Manager, Arthur Sypek, Esq., Municipal Attorney, Jack Oakley, Emergency Management Coordinator.

Special Proclamations, Recognitions and Presentations

Oath of Office Administered to New Firefighters

Lawrence Township Emergency Management Coordinator, Jack Oakley, introduced himself and thanked everyone for being present for the swearing in of the new Lawrence Township fire fighters. He stated that he is extremely honored and proud to increase the force of the Lawrence Township Fire Department to thirteen members with the addition of tonight's two fire fighters. Mr. Oakley shared that the candidates went

through a testing phase, a physical examination, a stringent background check, and finally a medical examination, earning their spot to become members of the fire department.

Mr. Oakley introduced the two candidates, Mr. Nicholas Ratigan and Tymair Simmons, and proceeded to share a brief biography for each firefighter prior to Mayor Bobbitt issuing their oath of office. Afterward, he recognized Council, Manager Kevin Nerwinski, and Municipal Manager Christopher Longo for their commitment toward increasing the Fire Department's staff and making sure the citizens of Lawrence Township are properly served, and stated that he knows Mr. Ratigan and Mr. Simmons will serve the Township well.

Public Participation

Mr. Robert Korkan, trustee of Lawrence Non-Profit Housing, Inc. (LNPH), wished to speak with Council regarding affordable housing in Lawrence Township. He explained that LNPH is the owner and operator of the one-hundred apartments located in Eggerts Crossing Village on Johnson Avenue, which partially fulfills the State's mandate to provide affordable housing in Lawrence Township, and shared that the trustees' purpose is to define LNPH's future role in supporting affordable housing. Mr. Korkan reported that they will be completing the strategic planning process in March, and hope to present the plan to Council in April. With regard to the re-envisioned Community Center, LNPH supports programs such as life-skills training, financial literacy education, career counselling, parental counselling, single-parent guidance, and access to vocational training. Mr. Korkan expressed his hope that all Township residents be considered when Council deliberates the future Community Center programs.

Mayor Bobbitt asked Mr. Korkan to provide Council or Municipal Clerk, Tonya Carter, with their finalized strategic plan when it becomes available, to which Mr. Korkan responded that it is his intention to do so.

Mr. Gary Backinoff, an attorney representing the Lawrence Non-Profit Housing, Inc. (LNPH), invited Council to visit the LNPH-sponsored Eggerts Crossing Village, explaining that they have had tremendous success with regard to revitalizing this neighborhood. He shared that the Township has always been supportive of LNPH, which shows what can be done in collaboration between a nonprofit and the Township to achieve great things. Mr. Backinoff stated that LNPH would like to assist the Township with the revitalization and rehabilitation of the Community Center, and indicated that they support the Mayor's Task Force recommendations for community-oriented programs.

Mr. Fred Vereen explained that he is also here tonight to talk about the Neighborhood Center. He handed Council a packet of information pertaining to the history of the Neighborhood Center, and additionally, provided brief background information on the history of Eggerts Crossing Village. Mr. Vereen stated he heard the Township had purchased the "Little Neighborhood Center," and expressed his hope that

Council would confer with him and other residents regarding their plans for the building, and work together with the community to make the building a monument to what it has done for both Eggerts Crossing and the Township of Lawrence.

Mr. Nerwinski reported that the Township had identified "The Little Neighborhood Center" to be an integral part of the Township's overall plan, with the purpose of preserving the building and celebrating its history. He explained that the Township will need partners in realizing what the building will become.

Ms. Sarah Stiff thanked Council for the opportunity to speak tonight, and stated that this is the first time she has attended a Town meeting. She revealed that she was compelled to speak tonight on behalf of the Community Center, as the upgrades are incomplete and the building remains vacant. She shared that she would like to see the Community Center provide programs like the ones offered at the Lawrence Township Senior Center. Finally, Ms. Stiff implored Council to make the Community Center a priority, creating a welcoming and well-run space for residents of all ages.

Mayor Bobbitt stated that he has been in conversation with his fellow Councilmembers, and they have agreed to move forward with producing a Request for Proposal (RFP). He explained that this RFP will be reflective of both Council, as well as the Mayor's Task Force, with regard to its goals, values and mission.

Councilwoman Patricia Farmer wished to publicly give credit to Mr. Nerwinski for his visionary and innovative idea with regard to the "Little Neighborhood Center." Additionally, she thanked the members of the public for all of their comments this evening.

Review and Revisions of Agenda

Mr. Sypek stated that they had originally planned to have a "late starter" Resolution for an award of a Non-Fair and Open Contract for a Special Counsel to be added to the agenda. However, after discussion with Manager Nerwinski, Mr. Sypek decided against this, instead suggesting that it should be added to the February 17th agenda as a "regular" Resolution.

Mr. Nerwinski stated that this pertains to the Lawrence Hopewell Trail (LHT), in which an extension in a certain area of the Township would complete a critical part of the loop. He is in agreement with Mr. Sypek that it should be placed on the February 17th agenda instead of adding it on tonight as a "late starter." He explained that there is a significant grant component involved, and expressed hope that mentioning it at tonight's meeting will demonstrate to the State that the Township is serious about moving forward with this particular segment of the pedestrian way.

Ms. Carter stated that Resolution No. 83-25 (18-H.8) is a duplicate of Resolution No. 84-25 (18-H.9) and must be removed from the agenda.

On a motion by Councilwoman Farmer, seconded by Councilwoman Santos, Resolution No. 83-25 (18-H.8) was moved to be removed from the agenda as it is a duplicate.

Awarding or Rejecting of Bids

On a motion by Ms. Santos, seconded by Mr. Kownacki, Resolution (9-A) Authorizing Awarding Contract to Techna-Pro Electrical, LLC for Traffic Signal Maintenance – 2026 was presented for adoption.

Mr. Nerwinski stated that this was actually approved at the last reading, but under a different account number, so the account number had to be corrected. This is a Resolution that approves the maintenance and servicing of traffic signals in Lawrence Township.

Introduction of Ordinances

There was no introduction of ordinances.

Adoption of Ordinances

Mayor Bobbitt read by title, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2502-25 SALARY ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF LAWRENCE—UNCLASSIFIED AND/OR EXEMPT, SEASONAL, EMERGENCY (NON-UNION) EMPLOYEES FOR 2023-2025 – Deleting the Title of Municipal Treasurer from Schedule B, Grade 18, and Adding the Title of Municipal Treasurer to Schedule B, Grade 23."

Mr. Nerwinski stated that this paves the way for a succession plan to replace current CFO, Peter Kiriakatis, who was supposed to retire December 1, 2025. He explained that the Township had commenced a search to have him replaced well before that date; however, they went through the process several times with various qualified candidates who had been extended an offer by the Township, only to have them reject the offer and choose a different path. Council has since interviewed and approved Mr. Christopher Hart, who has been hired as Municipal Treasurer, and will assume the role of CFO for Lawrence Township upon Mr. Kiriakatis' retirement. Finally, Mr. Nerwinski explained that the Municipal Budget was not impacted by this overlapping of two professionals.

Ordinance No. 2503-26

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. – 2502-25
SALARY ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF LAWRENCE – UNCLASSIFIED AND/OR EXEMPT,
SEASONAL, EMERGENCY (NON-UNION) EMPLOYEES FOR 2023-2025

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Lawrence, County of Mercer, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section I. Short Title

This ordinance shall be known and may be recited as "The Salary Ordinance of the Township of Lawrence – Unclassified and/or Exempt, Seasonal, Emergency (non-union) Employees for 2023-2025."

Section II. Salaried Employees

The attached list of salaried positions and job titles, Schedule A and Schedule B, are hereby authorized and assigned the appropriate salary ranges for 2023-2025, and are determined by date of hire as an employee of Lawrence Township.

This ordinance will continue the Township's consistent policy of providing comparable fringe benefits to exempt employees during their active service, as that provided to Supervisors, CWA Local 1032, through their collective bargaining agreement. The Township will still maintain the flexibility of granting retiree benefits to exempt employees hired after January 1, 2011. Accordingly, employees covered by this ordinance that are eligible for health and/or prescription benefits shall contribute to the cost of the said health benefit premium for medical and prescription coverage as required by law, specifically Chapter 78, P.L. 2011. All employees hired on or after January 1, 2014, shall contribute based upon the year four rates specified by said law and to be made an Appendix to a successor Agreement.

Section III. Part-Time or Seasonal Employees

The following part-time or seasonal positions and job titles are hereby authorized and assigned the following pay maximums commencing January 1, 2023, January 1, 2024, and January 1, 2025:

Section IV. Eligibility

The ranges in Section II of this ordinance shall pertain to individuals employed by the Township of Lawrence on or after the effective date of this ordinance.

Section V. Longevity

- A. Each employee hired before January 1, 2013, and covered by this agreement shall in addition to his/her regular wages and benefits, be paid longevity based upon years of service as of December 31, 2013, with the Township in accordance with the following amounts. Said amounts to be paid to an employee shall not be adjusted beyond the longevity amount being received by an eligible employee as of December 31, 2013. Longevity shall be pensionable and included as part of the employee's regular pay. Any employee hired on or after January 1, 2014, shall not be eligible to receive longevity pay at any time in the future.

Section VI. Other Personnel and Working Conditions

All other functions, responsibilities and rights not specifically enumerated in prior sections of this ordinance shall be judged to be within the province of management, subject only to the laws, rules and regulations of the New Jersey Department of Personnel, the provisions contained in applicable agreements (if any) or policy manuals, and by the issuance of Administrative Directives by the Municipal Manager.

Section VII. Repealer

All other ordinances or parts of ordinances adopted prior to the date of this ordinance that are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they relate to or concern the job classifications, salaries, and benefits listed in this ordinance.

Section VIII. Severability

If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be declared invalid for any reason, the remaining portions of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.

Section IX. Effective Date

- A. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after final adoption as provided by law.
- B. All salary or compensation provided for and by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of January.

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Mayor Bobbitt read by title, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY ON ALTMAWR AVENUE FOR OPEN SPACE PURPOSES."

Mr. Nerwinski reported that this is part of the Township's Open Space plan, and once ownership of the Pitt Stop property is obtained and remediated, this piece will help expand the space to create a passive park. He informed Council that Mr. Sypek is working with the other attorney with regard to this Open Space acquisition.

Ordinance No. 2504-26

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY  
ON ALTAMAWR AVENUE FOR OPEN SPACE PURPOSES

WHEREAS, the residents of Lawrence Township have previously approved, by public referendum, the acquisition of land for open space and conservation purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Lawrence has identified certain real property commonly known as 36 Altamawr Avenue, Lawrence Township, New Jersey, also designated on the official Tax Map of the Township as Block 1308, Lot 1, as appropriate for acquisition for open space purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Township Council has determined that acquisition of the property will further the public purposes of preserving open space and protecting community character; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Lawrence and the property owner have negotiated a purchase price of Eighty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$82,000.00);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Lawrence, County of Mercer, State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The Township of Lawrence is hereby authorized to acquire the real property known as 36 Altamawr Avenue, Lawrence Township, New Jersey, also known as Block 1308, Lot 1, for open space purposes, at a purchase price not to exceed \$82,000.00.
2. The Mayor, Municipal Manager, Township Attorney, and Township Clerk are hereby authorized to take all actions necessary to effectuate the acquisition authorized herein.
3. The funds for said acquisition are hereby certified as available from the Township Open Space Trust Fund and/or other lawful municipal funding sources.
4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after final passage and publication according to law.

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## **Manager's Report –**

There was no manager's report.

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## **Attorney's Report –**

Municipal Attorney, Arthur Sypek, reported that he would like to explain what is taking place with regard to Resolution No. 80-26 (18-H.5) Authorizing Resolution for Affordable Housing Settlement Agreement with 3641 Lawrenceville Road, LLC. The building is called the Gulick House, which has sat vacant for over thirty years, and although there was an attempt to convert it to a nursing home at one time, nothing ever came of this plan. He relayed that it has been under continual ownership for much of this time, and the current owners have now decided that they would like to develop this property. Mr. Sypek shared that the Township has tried to negotiate a settlement with them with regard to the number of Fair Housing units, but an agreement could not be reached, so they filed suit in the Superior Court of New Jersey. He revealed that both parties have participated in mediations pursuant to the court order from the former assignment judge, and they have finally come to a reasonable combination. Mr. Sypek recounted that the Township's initial offer from the Planning Board was 64 units with thirteen Affordable Housing units, which was not accepted by the court, so the Township has now agreed to 110 units with twenty percent (22 units) set aside for low and moderate housing, which must now go through the Planning Board for full approval. He feels that this settlement was the best that the Township could do in litigation, with no guarantees that they would be able to receive a settlement as reasonable as this under the Township's Fourth Round obligation. Mr. Sypek noted that this "eyesore" will now become a modern residential building on Lawrenceville Road, and will be a benefit to the community.

Mr. Nerwinski stated that this was the subject of at least two Zoning Board applications for building an assisted living facility, which was hotly contested and never realized. He explained that the owner has now shifted to the idea of development, originally asking for much more than what the Township was comfortable giving, and because the Township said no, the owners filed a lawsuit the day before the deadline to challenge the numbers. Mr. Nerwinski shared that if the Township were to have lost the litigation, every indication was that the result would have been worse than what they currently negotiated. He relayed that the Township would have abandoned their right to control and regulate what the complex would look like and where things would be situated. This settlement, he explained, allows the Township to focus on consistency and have a voice in the planning of their community.

Further discussion was had with regard to the meaning of a non-condemnation redevelopment area versus a straight redevelopment plan, as well as confirming that this will be the last Affordable Housing piece that will allow the Master Plan to move forward.

In honor of Black History Month, Ms. Farmer wished to place on the record a quote from Thurgood Marshall, the first African-American Supreme Court Justice, who viewed the Constitution "as a living document, that required corrective amendments, specifically the fourteenth amendment, to fulfill this promise of equality." She stated that Justice Marshall believed it was defective from the start, but became a realistic document of freedom over time. He famously emphasized fighting for its ideal, stating that "we are going to make it work for all of us."
